Most nights there was no money left to buy food for Abdi, his dad or little sister.





Abdi's dad could not afford to buy the family breakfast, so Abdi would often arrive at school hungry. Lunchtime was the best part of his day because he would have something to eat.

The Headteacher noticed that Abdi always seemed hungry and was finding it difficult to concentrate in class.

She asked Abdi what was happening and Abdi explained that he would often go without food. Weekends and holidays were the worst because the family would go for days without anything.



The Headteacher spoke to Abdi's dad and he explained that all of the money they had was being used to care for Abdi's grandmother. Abdi's Headteacher contacted the Catholic Children's Society and asked if they could help. Within 24 hours, the Catholic Children's Society gave the family money

to buy food. The next day Abdi came to school happy and full of

energy.

Abdi's grandmother is now better and Abdi's dad has gone back to work.






Joseph is 16 years old and lives with his mum, dad and younger brother.

Joseph tried to keep up with his school work in hospital and get ready for his exams.


After four months Joseph came home. His operations had gone well and he was now able to walk short distances on crutches.

Annie's Headteacher contacted the Catholic Children's Society and with money from their Crisis Fund they paid the family's deposit so that they could rent the flat.

Annie now has a home where she feels safe. Her mum has just found a new job and is so happy that she can look after Annie again.
