Parking

St Mary's Catholic Primary School Street

As I know you are aware Enfield Council have set up a School Street for St Mary's between Alexandra Road and Bursland Road. This has been in place for quite a while now.

A 'School Street' is an area transformed into a pedestrian and cycling zone operating Monday to Friday during the school term, during set times at drop-off and pick-up times.

School Streets aim to:

- ensure the safety of school students as they arrive to and leave school.
- improve the air quality near the school, and
- encourage more young people to walk and cycle to school.

When the School Street zone is in operation during the designated hours, motor vehicles cannot pass through the zone, except for those who have applied for and received a permit or exemption.

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The times of operation for the St Mary's Primary School Street are 8.15am to 9.15am, and 2.30pm to 3.30pm from Monday to Friday during school term time only and operates using a camera enforced system.

Please take care so that you do not receive an expensive fine. Fines are not paid to the school.



School Uniform

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Thank you to the great number of pupils wearing the correct dark blue summer dress.

Remember it is fine for your child to continue to wear a grey skirt / trousers and polo shirt during the summer term.

Children are not encouraged to wear summer dresses which are not dark blue check (these other light blue dresses are actually the summer uniform of another school).

Some of the children are wearing short school uniform trousers which are a little cooler in the warm weather.

Please check your child's uniform. Sometimes children accidentally take home the wrong sweatshirts etc.

Try to ensure your child's name is on each item of uniform. During the summer children take off sweat shirts a lot more. If the sweatshirt is labelled it is much easier to return it to its owner. It's good for children to be able to wear a hat during the summer when it becomes very warm. School hats (with neck protection flaps) are now available from the School Office for £4.00. Children are encouraged to wear these instead of other non - uniform baseball caps which are not permitted.

On PE days children are able to wear their PE uniform (or on any other school day if they wish). It must however be the correct PE uniform.



Please ensure your child is wearing the correct joggers in school blue or navy school shorts.

Also your child must wear their school shoes and change into their trainers/plimsolls for their PE sessions.

Please note that children are not allowed to wear nail varnish or false nails. Rings, bracelets, necklaces must not be worn to school. Lines, logos, Mohican cuts, dye or designs in the hair are not encouraged.

Pupils are asked not to wear makeup.

Thank you to the great number of parents who ensure their children wear the correct school uniform each day. The majority of children always look very smart.

Talk to your child about phone safety - Police Message for Parents and Carers

Mobile phones are a great way to stay in contact with family and friends. Many children starting secondary school in September own one or have access to one.

As useful as they are, they can make children vulnerable to thieves who are particularly interested in new models and other valuable items such as cash, airpods and expensive coats. Reducing robbery is our top priority and our officers are working hard to catch those responsible, with activity to prevent it taking place daily.


There are however, a number of things you can do to help reduce your child's risk of becoming a victim and keep safe whilst using their phone. If you can, talk to them about where and how they use their phone using the following advice:

Safety when out and about:

- Keep your phone and valuables out of sight in a safe place when travelling to and from school. Be careful if you take your phone out in public places.
- Bus stops, train stations and surrounding areas are common target areas for thieves, who can approach on foot,

moped or on a pedal bike or e-scooter.

- Earphones/headphones can distract you, stopping you from seeing or hearing someone approach you from behind.
- Don't confront a thief it's not worth risking your own safety for possessions that can be replaced.
- Robbery or attempted robbery are serious crimes and should be reported. It's important you seek help straight away by dialing 999 rather than contacting police when you get home. Use a friend's phone or the phone of a trusted adult. This gives us the best chance to catch the suspects, recover any stolen property and ensure your safety.
- If you have information about a robbery and do not want to report it to police, speak to Fearless 100 % anonymously at www.fearless.org. Fearl ess is the youth service of independent charity Crimestoppers.



> Whether you have a phone or not, memorise or keep a parent/carer's phone number in a separate place in your bag/zipped pocket in case of emergency.

Help protect your child's phone if it's stolen:

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- Use your device's security features, apps or PIN locking mechanisms to protect your data and prevent the phone being used.
- Keep a record of the phone's IMEI number (not on your phone!).
 This is a 15-digit unique number which can be obtained by keying in *#06#. You need this information if the phone is lost or stolen.
- Consider installing a tracker app, available online.

ADMISSIONS FOR ACADEMIC YEAR 2025/2026


Due to the fact that there are now fewer pupils in London (decrease in the population of children) and the issues with finding affordable places to live we currently have places in some of our 2025/2026 class groups.

Re: Reducing Smartphone Use in Childhood

Dear Parents and Guardians,

We are writing to you as a group of schools in Enfield, with the support of Enfield Council.

This letter explains that, from September 2025, **Primary School aged children will not be allowed to bring a smartphone to school**, and that the new cohort of students joining **Year 7 at Secondary School will not be allowed to bring a smartphone to school** for the duration of their studies from Years 7-11.

We also ask that you delay allowing your child to have a smartphone at all until they are aged 14 or older, and to delay access to social media until they are 16.

Why have we made this decision?

Although there are many benefits, there is increasing evidence that smartphone use has negative effects on the wellbeing and mental health of young people, and poses a number of significant safeguarding risks. Smartphone use has been linked to impaired attention and focus, sleep deprivation, mental health issues, online bullying, exposure to harmful online content and people, increased risk of mugging, and increased loneliness and social isolation. We want young people to prioritise in-person interactions and to benefit from the stronger social skills, empathy and sense of community real-world interactions offer.

In many of our schools, mobile phone bans are already in place and children are protected from some of the issues outlined above. These risks remain outside of school. We encourage parents to delay allowing children to have a smartphone at all until they are aged 14 or older, and to delay access to social media until age 16.

If you feel your child needs a device for safety reasons, consider instead a phone without internet connectivity (a 'brick' phone), an Airtag or a fully locked down phone with no internet or communication apps installed.

We know that many of you are keen to delay giving your child a smartphone at the age of 11, 12 or 13, so we hope that the position we are adopting as schools will support you in your decision to ask children to wait until they are older to get a smartphone.

We hope that you will support us in our aim to make sure that your children are happy and safeguarded by being smartphone free.

ZEPETO

ZEPETO has an age rating of over 13. Users create their own avatars and can design rooms. ZEPETO is a social networking app and therefore users can chat with others. Due to the communication option, there are the usual risks, such as your child seeing inappropriate content or online bullying. In-App purchases are also available on this platform.

Parental controls are not available, but a user can change some settings within privacy and content settings, for example to change who can direct message you.

Nintendo Switch 2

The Nintendo Switch 2 was released last month and has a new communication feature that you should be aware of.

GameChat - NEW

GameChat is included within a Nintendo

Switch Online membership and allows up to 12 people to chat while playing games. Players can share their screen, even if they are playing different games, chat with the built-in microphone and as the Nintendo Switch 2 allows cameras to be connected (sold separately), even video chat. If your child is using this feature, then ensure they know how to report other users.

Parental Controls

There is a free Nintendo Switch Parental Controls app that can be linked with your Nintendo Switch to monitor what your child is playing. The app creates a report so you can see which video games your child is playing and for how long. It also allows you to set which games your child can play, based on the PEGI age rating and restricts your child from sending or receiving messages from other users. GameChat settings can also be adjusted. Children under the age of 15 can only use GameChat if allowed by you through the app. They can then only use GameChat with people that you approve. 
Check age ratings

PEGI provides age classifications for video games. PEGI considers the age suitability of a game, not the level of difficulty. Online Challenges

According to Ofcom's latest Children's Media Use and Attitudes report "funny videos or those showing pranks or challenges continue to be the most popular type of VSP (video-sharing platforms) content for children, watched by 68% of 3-17-year-olds who watch videos." [source-https://www.ofcom.org.uk/media-use-and-attitudes/media-habits-children/children-and-parents-media-use-and-attitudes-report-2025]

If your child is watching this type of content, then you need to chat to them regularly, particularly about online challenges and the risks that they can pose. There are challenges online that are risky/dangerous. Sadly, there are reports that children have died as a consequence of attempting online challenges.



Children may not yet have developed the skills and ability to critically analyse that what they see online is not always safe for them to replicate. Make sure your child knows that they should talk to you (or another trusted adult) if they are thinking about trying something that they have seen online.

If your child has not heard about an online challenge, then do not draw attention to it as this may lead to them searching for it out of curiosity, so just talk about challenges in a general sense. Furthermore, reassure your child that challenges that suggest that terrible things will happen if they do not complete the tasks are not real.

Omegle (and similar platforms)

Whilst the original Omegle no longer exists, there is now Ome.tv, other Omegle copycat sites as well as other sites with a similar concept. We cannot stress enough that these sites should not be accessed by children due to the potential content and language used, which can be explicit. As an example, Ome.tv connects you randomly to other people via video chat from across the world. Ome.tv does state that it should only be used by adults.

Conversation Starter

Are you struggling to start a conversation with your child about online safety? Why not try discussing this scenario with them. What would they do and how would you help them?

Amira and her classmates have a WhatsApp group. One evening, Amira notices that some group members are sharing unkind jokes and memes about another student, Leo, who isn't part of the group. The messages start as playfubut quickly turn mean-spirited. Amira feels uncomfortable but isn't sure what to do. So, what should Amira do?

First, Amira should **not join in** with the mean messages. Then, although difficult, she could **speak up** in the group by saying something kind like: "Let's not be mean. This isn't fair to Leo." Finally, she should **tell a trusted adult**.

Discuss how group chats should be fun for everyone, not a place to hurt others Emphasise that being part of a group chat means we all have a responsibility to keep it respectful. If you see something that doesn't feel right, like Amira did, it's okay to speak up or talk to a trusted adult. Remind your child that they won't be punished if they tell you something like this.

Remember, even if Leo doesn't see the messages, it's still wrong to be unkind. Real legends lift each other up — they don't tear others down.


