# St Mary's Catholic Primary School Street

As you know Enfield Council are proposing a School Street for St Mary's Catholic Primary School on Durants Road between Alexandra Road and Bursland. You can see from the planters and signs where the School Street will begin and end.

A 'School Street' is an area transformed into a pedestrian and cycling zone operating Monday to Friday during the school term, during set times

at drop-off and pick-up times. School Streets aim to:

- ensure the safety of school students as they arrive to and leave school.
- improve the air quality near the school, and
- encourage more young people to walk and cycle to school.

When the School Street zone is in operation during the designated hours, motor vehicles cannot pass through the zone, except for those who have applied and received a permit or exemption.

The proposed times of operation for the St Mary's Primary School Street are 8.15am to 9.15am, and 2.30pm to 3.30pm from Monday to Friday during the school terms only and will be operated manually using gates and marshals with the view to switching to a permanent camera enforced system in the future.

Our next step is to recruit marshals. We need your help! Please sign up at the school office to volunteer to manage the barrier areas in the

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morning and / or afternoon when the School Street is in operation.

Volunteering is easy to do and a great way to get involved with the school community, meet other parents and our neighbours while you are helping to create a safer space for all of our children!

# Kay Activities for a Marshal:

- Managing a closure point, setting out, opening and closing the gates
- Managing vehicle access
- Escorting exempted vehicles through the closure
- Speaking to any members of the public who come along while the school street is in place.

Training is provided for this very important voluntary role

Thank you to the parents who have already volunteered. We have been told that we need more volunteers before we can



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proceed with the training

# Parking

Parking difficulties around the school tend to occur (and have happened already this term) when children are being collected from / dropped off to school each day. I do understand how busy Durants Road can be but please make every effort to park responsibly (preferably away from Durants Road) as you drop off / collect your child each day.

I hope that during the rest of this school term while we wait for our school street to start all parents and carers will act in a responsible manner both for the safety of our children and a positive association with our neighbours. Thankfully so many already do.

Parents a huge thank you to so many of you for your wonderful support. More and more children are walking,

cycling or scooting to school. Lots of parents too are parking away from the school and walking with their children

all requests not to do so, are still blocking driveways and parking illegally please park away from **Durants Road and** 

walk with your child!

For those adults who, despite

Please try hard to:

- Park away from **Durants Road and** walk with your child. This is better for your general health and reduces the fumes and pollution around the school. If you can, leave the car at home and try to build the walking time into your child's day. If a child minder or another family member brings your child to school please encourage them to park away from Durants Road.
- Please do not sit in the car with the engine running. This is not good for the health of others.
- Never park in / across any of the driveways even for a minute. This is disrespectful and causes a lot of problems for the

school with local residents.

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Never park on the zig-zag lines during the designated no parking times (please check the signs) or in the disabled bays which are reserved for blue badge holders.

# Our Faith

The "door of faith" (Acts 14:27) is always open for us. ushering us into the life of communion with God and offering entry into his Church. It is possible to cross that threshold when the word of God is proclaimed and the heart allows itself to be shaped by transforming grace. To enter through that door is to set out on a journey that lasts a lifetime. It begins with baptism (cf. Rom 6:4), through which we can address God as Father, and it ends with the passage through death to eternal life (From Homily for the beginning of the Petrine Ministry of the Bishop of Rome (24 April 2005): AAS 97 (2005), 710).

On 11th October 2012, all around the world, Church communities marked the opening of the Year of Faith.



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The Year of Faith was an invitation initially from Pope Benedict XVI and subsequently from Pope Francis to all Catholics throughout the world, both as individuals and as members of a Church community, to focus on their faith so as to deepen their understanding of what it means to have the Gift of Faith and live it each day. It was a time to nourish our understanding of Church teaching and to endeavour to develop our own spirituality.

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Although the Year of Faith is now over we still need to continue to work on nourishing our own faith and helping our children to grow in their faith. What could we as adults do?

- Take our children to Mass and participate through joining in and responding. Children learn through our example.
- Encourage our older children through our example to attend the Sacrament of Reconciliation (Confession).
- Read the Bible / Bible stories with our children.
- Explore the lives of the saints with our children.
- Help our children to pray.
- Volunteer in school or in the Parish.
- Encourage our children to contribute to Parish and School charity events.

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# School Fund

# Thinking Skills

The current classroom displays include the use of the thinking hats.

As you know our thinking is usually affected by emotional responses, prior knowledge and experience and at times confusion. The de Bono '6 Thinking Hats' method provides a framework for thinking. We think in one direction at the time. In the '6 Hats' method thinking is divided into six different modes, each of which is represented by a coloured hat.



White Hat - Information (facts. information, questions. What you have. What you need. Where to get it.). \*

Red Hat - Feelings (emotions, hunches, intuition, instincts, feelings).

Black Hat – Caution (caution, judgement, assessment, weaknesses, difficulties, dangers and potential problems).

Yellow Hat - Benefits (benefits, values, good points, likelihood).

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Green Hat - Creativity (alternatives, possibilities, new ideas, options, new concepts).

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Blue Hat - Organising the Thinking (thinking about thinking, next steps, summarising, clarifying).

Children are enjoying making use of the hats in class again this year. Ask your child to see if he / she can tell you anything about the hats. Perhaps you might like to try it at home when coming to a decision about / discussing something with your child.

# Habits of Mind

'Successful people keep moving. They make mistakes but never quit' - something Conrad Hilton said.



Staff have also been trained in the use of the 'Habits of Mind' - these are a set of habits or dispositions which focus on developing a mature, independent and successful learner / citizen in the long term. You will recognise many habits of mind immediately as you will have tried or are currently trying to develop these dispositions in your own

children. There are sixteen in total. They are: Persisting,

Managing impulsivity, Listening with understanding and empathy, Thinking flexibly,

Metacognition, Striving for accuracy, Questioning and posing problems,

Applying past knowledge to new situations.

Thinking and communicating with clarity and precision, Gathering data through all senses.

Creating, imagining, innovating, Responding with wonderment and awe,

Taking responsible risks, Finding humour, Thinking independently, Remaining open to continuous learning.

We are introducing these again gradually to the children. Ask your child if he / she has focused on any of the habits of mind in school. Don't hesitate to ask the teacher about the current habit of mind focus in your child's class.

# Sickness

We have been advised by the London Borough of Enfield that any child who has been sick

must not return to school for 48 hours

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# Uniform

Our uniform is part of St. Mary's identity. I would be grateful if you could encourage your child to wear full neat uniform each day including the correct socks, shoes, hair accessories and PE uniform. Children are encouraged to always try to have shirts tucked in and all buttons closed. They are asked not to tie sweatshirts around their waists.

Boots and brightly coloured coats are not encouraged.

For health and safety reasons only small stud earrings are permitted. These must be removed for PE.

So many children wear the correct uniform - thank you parents for your support with this.

### Hair

Please ensure long hair is tied back in school colours only (blue / black / white). No highlights, designs, lines or dyes to be put in hair please. Remember nits love long free flowing hair too!

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Mohican hairstyles are not permitted.

### Nails

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False nails or nail polish are not permitted in school.

Please encourage your child to respect the uniform policy by leaving all jewellery at home.

# Holidays and Absences

I would urge you to try not to book holidays during term time as time away from school can unsettle children and affect their progress. I regret that we are unable to authorise time off during the term which is requested for holidays.

Any requests for time off (special circumstances will only be considered) must be put in writing in advance to the Headteacher.

It is not school policy to provide homework for absence during term time.

We are required to ask for a written note to explain any absence from school.

Our overall attendance up to the end of the first half-term was 96.87%.

This is below our target of 98% but we know that some families have had to deal with the usual bugs that are going around

The class with the highest attendance in the first halfterm was Year 5.St. Anthony (98.56%) very closely followed by Year 3,5t. Cecilia (98.45%).

Next were Year 2, Fatima (98.11%), Year 6,5t. Christopher (97.76%) and Year 2, Faith (97.06%).

Then Year 4, St. Peter (96.94%, Year 6, St. Catherine (96.83%), Year 3, St. Bernadette (96.67%), Reception, Grace (96.55%) and and Year 5, St. Joseph (96.49%).

Thank you to all parents for all you do to ensure that your child is in school each day.

# Handwashing Advice



We know that it is important that everyone continues to wash their hands more often, using soap and water for at least 20 seconds. Hand washing with soap employs mechanical action that loosens bacteria and viruses from the skin. rinsing them into the drain. Drying hands afterwards makes the skin less hospitable to the virus. Hand sanitiser can

be effective if soap is not available or the situation makes using soap less feasible (i.e. when outside) but using hand sanitiser provides none of the virus-destroying friction that rubbing your hands together and rinsing with water provides.

Like many organisations during the two years of Covid we have had to adapt our services. Thankfully, now that the threat from Covid is receding we have returned to our open-door policy. A breakfast, lunch and washing facilities are available 7 days a week, Housing & Welfare Advice five days a week, a clothing store one day a week and medical care one day a week. We also reopened our computer

room in mid-August. All of our services are free at point of use.

We are dependent on voluntary donations to raise approx. 85% of our annual £470,000 budget. Without your support we would be unable to offer the services we do. Any help you can give, financially or practically (food or men's clothing) throughout the year, will benefit some of the poorest members of our society.

# School Dinners



School meals cost £2.50 per day / £12.50 per week (from September 2016).



Please pay in advance (at least a week in advance) online using the Parent Pay system or ask the Office staff for a Pay Point card.

Remember that if your child has school meals (and is not entitled to free meals) and you don't pay for them the school has to find the money to pay your debt. Always pay for your child's meals.

Your child may be entitled to free meals. To qualify for free school meals parents or guardians must be in receipt of:

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- Income support
- Income based job seekers allowance
- Asylum seekers subsistence payment (support under part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999)
- Child tax credit (but not working tax credit) only and have an annual income of less than £16.190

Please contact the school office if you feel your child qualifies for free meals.

ADMISSIONS FOR ACADEMIC YEAR 2022/2023 Due to the fact that there are now fewer pupils in London (decrease in the population of children) and the issues with finding affordable housing (as is usually the case some of our families were moved out of London over the summer period and in the first half of this term) we currently have places in our Nursery, Reception Year 1 and Year 3 2022 year groups and some

places in some of our other year groups.

Thank you parents for recommending our school and helping to build up our pupil numbers. Some new children have joined us again this half-term. Please continue to do this.

From our School Inspection Reports:

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'The leadership team has maintained the good quality of education in the school since the last inspection...Pupils make good progress from their various starting points...Their willingness to come to school is evident in their well above average rates of attendance...You have successfully maintained the above-average attainment by the end of Year 6 in reading, writing and mathematics...Teachers form good relationships with pupils, providing them with a wealth of interesting activities across the curriculum. Pupils concentrate well in class and are keen to work with each other...Pupils say they feel safe at school and know how to avoid danger in the wider community'(OFSTED Inspection, June 2018).

'A. Classroom religious education is outstanding

 The school has adapted and developed the themes of the Religious Education Curriculum Directory in an excellent manner to meet

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the learning needs of the pupils' of St Mary's.

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- The religious education programme in use fully delivers this content and the use of De Bono system in religious education pushes pupils to develop their understanding further.
- After carefully analysing the needs of their pupils, the school has developed a curriculum and teaching programme that has reached outstanding achievement by the pupils in religious education.
- Teachers have high expectations and plan lessons that deepen pupils' religious literacy.
- Since the last inspection, staff confidence in recording and assessment has been demonstrably achieved with the evidence of the clarity and confidence on the part of the staff in planning imaginative lessons based on the religious education programme followed in the school.
- The headteacher is also the religious education curriculum coordinator and she takes the closest interest in developing the excellent teaching and learning of religious education in the school.
- The chair of governors is a recent appointment but with her years of experience on the governing body she is clear in her role of both support and challenge in pursuing the special

responsibility of governors of a Catholic school.

# B. The Catholic life of the school is outstanding

- The curriculum fully conforms to the classroom curriculum time of at least 10% for religious education and teaching is fully in line with the requirements of the Bishops' Conference.
- The previous inspection asked the school to develop pupils' understanding of Catholic Social Teaching and to help pupils understand the ethics of the market place and fair trade. The school has fully addressed these priorities, both in their classroom teaching and in the encouragement offered when choosing charities to support.
- The pupils of St Mary's enjoy an outstanding experience of prayer, liturgy and Catholic worship.
- Pupils and staff have a deep understanding of the call to 'human flourishing' and are given opportunities to develop and celebrate their gifts and talents.
- Partnership with the parents is excellent; they appreciate and support all that the

school provides for their children.

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The leadership and management of the school are very effective in promoting the Catholic life of the school. The head is strong and devoted in providing both oversight and support on all aspects of Catholic life. The contribution and regular visits of the parish priest provides a strong and stable reinforcement of the foundational position of Catholicism in the life of the school' (OFSTED Section 48 Inspection, September 2019).

# Religious Education

# **Topic Theme: From Advent to Christmas**

This unit will explore the events, rituals and practices of Advent and Christmas, in time with the Liturgical Year of the Church.

Learning opportunities include:	Monitoring opportunities:
<ul> <li>Coming to know Jesus is God the Father's Son.</li> <li>Hearing the story of Christmas.</li> <li>Coming to know that Mary is the Mother of Jesus.</li> <li>Experiencing that a Church is a special place where God's people gather to pray.</li> <li>Experiencing liturgical celebrations in a variety of simple settings.</li> <li>Experiencing praying with others as a celebration</li> <li>Joining in simple prayers and hymns</li> <li>Considering ways in which a Christian family and parish share and celebrate life, and show care for one another</li> </ul>	Children's development will be monitored through observation and the collection of work samples for their portfolio.

# **Affective and Spiritual Dispositions**

It is hoped that pupils will develop:

- An understanding that the stories of Jesus in the Bible link with the liturgical seasons of the church year.
- A familiarity with the seasons of Advent and Christmas, during which we anticipate and celebrate the incarnation: God in our world.

# Activities to try at home

Parents are the first educators of their child in faith. Your child's learning in religious education occurs best when the family and the school are engaged in talking about the same topics. Help your child by trying one or more of these activities while this unit is being taught:

- Talk to your children about Advent and Christmas how it is celebrated in the Church and in wider society. Note the different cultural expressions of Christmas: cards in other languages, foods and other cultures, customs and celebrations of other communities.
- Talk to your child about birth: their own, yours and other members of your family. Talk about your ancestors: grandparents and great grandparents. Think about your own family heritage.
- Read stories about Christmas. Remember there are two distinct stories in the Gospel: many picture stories amalgamate the two!

# An idea for prayer at home:

Have an Advent wreath as a focal point in your home. Light a candle for each week of Advent and pray 'God of light, help us to be people who walk with you towards the birth of your son'.

# Religious Education

# Key Idea: From Advent to Christmas

This framework of learning is intended as the second for the academic year 2022-2023 and the first of the Liturgical year, Year A. In keeping with the Liturgical year, this framework teaches the season of Advent as a time of preparation for the season of Christmas, according to the Gospel of Matthew. Pupils learn about the O Antiphons, said as part of Evening Prayer on the seven days before December 24th. Pupils finish this unit by learning Matthew's account of the birth of Jesus.

# **Attitudes and Spiritual Dispositions**

# It is hoped that pupils will develop:

- An appreciation of the gift of God's presence born again into the world at Christmas.
- An openness to the incarnation in their own lives.
- An appreciation of the truths contained in Scripture.
- A willingness to pray during Advent.

# Activities to try at home


You are the first educator of your child in faith. Your child's learning in religious education will be much greater if you and the school are engaged in talking about the same ideas and beliefs.

# **Early Years**

Is your child online? It's important that devices are set up with ageappropriate parental controls and access is restricted to appropriate apps/content. We would advise that children only access devices when you are with them. Sometimes, regardless of what controls we have in place, children may accidentally view inappropriate content so it's important we are around to help them if they do.

The Australian eSafety Commissioner has published a short booklet including advice and guidance on how to navigate the online world with your child. # Roblox – updated PEGI rating

PEGI have announced a change to the age rating for Roblox. PEGI used to rate Roblox as 7+, however because of the huge level of user generated content within Roblox, PEGI have changed the rating to a Parental Guidance label (icon shown right). # What is Roblox?

You can either use Roblox to create games or play games that other users have created. As a lot of the content is user generated, it may mean not all games will be suitable for your child to view/play. It is important to set up Parental controls appropriate to your child.

# Allowed Experiences - NEW

Roblox has introduced Allowed Experiences, which allows you to select ageappropriate experiences, so your child can only join experiences that match their age set. Please note that experiences above the age restriction set may be seen in search results. Age categories available are 9+, 13+ and all ages. # What should I be aware of?

Chat Facility - Players can chat to each other on Roblox. You can add parental controls to turn this feature off completely or add restrictions. Virtual Currency - Players can buy Robux (their virtual currency) to buy ingame upgrades or accessories. If you do not want your child to purchase them, then ensure you set the Monthly Spend Restriction to zero. Game content – as mentioned, games are created by different users so sometimes the content may not be appropriate for your child.

Blocking users and reporting – ensure your child knows how to do this.

# What should I do?

- Play the game with your child.
- Explore the parental controls within Roblox and set as appropriate.
- Show your child how to use the Report Abuse system within Roblox to report inappropriate content and how to block other users.

# Discord

Discord is a social networking app used by gamers to **chat to each other**. There can be in app purchases through Discord's premium subscription service. The minimum age to access Discord is 13. The Apple App store rates it as 17+. Discord is made up of servers, which are spaces for groups to chat, upload files and share images etc. Anybody can set up a server and they can either be public or private. Users can video call and send direct messages to other individuals or groups.

Children who play online games such as Fortnite may use Discord to chat about the game (rather than the game's own chat facility).

# How can I make it safer?

# What do I need to be aware of?

We always encourage you to chat to your child to see why they use different apps/websites and ensure that they know how to block users and what to do if they see any inappropriate content. It is important to be aware that Discord does include video/voice calling which cannot be filtered. # Yubo

Yubo is a social network, which you must be over 13 years of age to join although the App store rate it as 17+. Those aged 13 to 18 years old must have parental permission and will join a separate Yubo community that is for under-18s. Yubo do use an ageverification system (you must take a photo of your face and then facial age estimation technology is used to check)

You make 'friends' by swiping right on someone's profile picture and if they do the same on yours then you can chat with them or stream live videos. Due to the nature of this app, your child may come across content that is no appropriate to them. If your child does use this app, then ensure they know how to use the app's reporting facilities and know how to block other users.

# What do I need to be aware of?

Location: Users have the choice to share their location. You can hide/show your location at any time (country will always be visible). Location is disabled for all users under 18.

Live Streaming: - this is when somebody broadcasts live (real time). Inappropriate Content

**YuBucks** - Yubo's official Currency, can be used to gain additional functionality

Over the weekend I heard on national radio a headteacher talking about how the school meals in their school had been regressing in quality and portion size because of the economic climate. As a result, I have felt it necessary to reach out and talk about this narrative and how Enfield Catering are responding to this and be clear in what we are doing and what we are not doing.

One of the key points being talked about is the **quality** and **quantity** of school's meals and how it is at threat of being diminished.

Enfield Catering are taking the approach of <u>not</u> reducing portions sizes. Portion sizes are set by the school food standards and this is the guidance we use and follow and are continuing to follow even with the rise of food costs.

Our commitment is to ensure that we are serving the correct amount of food to children, this does mean we are absorbing these rises, but we feel it would be wrong for this to negatively impact the children in reduced portions of food. Our offer is a main course, made up of a protein, starch and vegetable plus dessert & unlimited salad bar and bread. This is how it will remain.

Reducing portions is not a strategy we agree with nor are we looking to scope this in any operational way whatsoever.

Enfield Catering are <u>not regressing</u> on the <u>quality</u> of our meals. We are still using fresh produce and cook from scratch, on site daily. We are continuing this approach, again despite rising costs, we feel it would be wrong for this to negatively impact the children by providing worse quality food.

Other caterers may defer to using bought in, readymade items or ultra-processed foods to mitigate their costs, it is this that will impact on the quality of food that they serve. We are not doing this.

Diminishing food quality is not a strategy we agree with nor are we looking to scope this in any operational way.

We are committed to aspiring to be providing the best schools meals in the borough and continue to do this with fresh ingredients, school food standard portions, reflecting the food culture throughout the borough and connecting children with their food from farm to fork.

# INFORMATION: An update on the free flu vaccine and COVID-19 booster for school settings and local authorities

The UK Health Security Agency is urging everyone <u>eligible</u> for a free flu vaccine and a COVID-19 booster to take up the offer as soon as possible ahead of what could be a winter with respiratory viruses circulating widely.

All primary school children and secondary school children in years 7, 8 and 9, will be offered the flu vaccine in order of school year (starting with the youngest first). The flu nasal spray will be used this year, which is usually given at school. GP surgeries are also inviting children aged two and three years old (age on 31 August) for this nasal spray vaccination at their practices. Most young children will not have encountered flu yet. This means they will not have built up any natural immunity to this virus, so it is particularly important for them to take up the flu vaccine this year.

All adults aged 50 to 64 years who are not in a clinical risk are now also eligible for the flu vaccine. The NHS will announce in due course when and how people in this age group will be able to get their free flu jab.

For COVID-19, the vaccine remains the best form of defence against the virus, and we encourage those eligible to come forward. Taking up both the COVID-19 booster and the flu jab is an essential form of protection against the most severe respiratory viruses in circulation this winter.

The vaccine is administered as a nasal spray and is completely pain free for your child

Please note: The Flu Nasal spray contains porcine gelatine, however there is an alternative available as an injection. Please select this option on the consent form (link above). The injection will be administered at school, however if you prefer your child to be vaccinated in our clinic, please contact us before the school session (date above).

# Vaccination information and consent forms

We would be grateful if you could complete the e-consent form for the vaccination as soon as possible and no later than 48 hours before the school session (date above).

If you prefer your child not to be vaccinated, please complete the consent form and select 'No' and we will no longer contact you for consent.

Public Health England have a duty to protect the public from disease and this includes providing vaccination services which are fulfilled by NHS England working with Local Authorities and schools. This

duty allows schools to share basic contact information with NHS England so they can monitor who has and who has not had a vaccination.

Whilst we strongly recommend every child has their vaccinations, we will not do so without the appropriate consent for each.

If you experience any problems accessing the forms, please telephone 0208 702 3499 and the team will be happy to help.

The information provided on the submitted form will be securely held on the child's electronic health record until they are 25 years old.

The NHS Trust collects personal information to ensure that individuals receive appropriate care and treatment and to meet certain statutory obligations. This information is kept, together with details of the care provided, because it may be needed if you require treatment again. The Trust Privacy Notice provides more information relating to how your information is processed.
