THIRD SUNDAY OF EASTER

'Why are you so agitated, and why these doubts rising in your hearts? Look at my hands and feet: yes, it is I indeed'

Today's passage continues the story of the two disciples who encountered the Risen Christ on the road to Emmaus and in the breaking of bread. The experience of the Risen Lord could not be contained and the two returned to Jerusalem to tell the eleven that they had seen Jesus. In the midst of their conversations, Jesus appears, offering peace. The disciples were terrified thinking that he was a ghost. While Jesus Let them touch him, they were still incredulous and did not recognise him until after he shared a meal with them and spoke the words that helped them to understand the scriptures. This was very similar to the Emmaus encounter. This part of the story emphasizes the physical reality of the resurrected body of the Lord. In today's story the disciples touch him, they can see the marks of the wounds in his hands and feet and eat with him. He is no Ghost.

What troubles your heart today. In what areas of your life do you need greater faith?

The reality of love

In touch

e might hear the idiom "out of touch" about a person who isn't informed or doesn't have the same ideas as most people about something. It's also a phrase which means we no longer see or communicate with someone. Being "out of touch with reality" is more serious. It describes a mental state where you feel detached from your surroundings which seem unreal. In these examples touch itself isn't a feature.

The power of touch is extraordinary. Touch causes the brain to release oxytocin and stimulates the release of other feelgood hormones at the same time as reducing stress hormones. Physical contact from someone you care about makes you feel safe. Touch is the first sense we acquire.

As human beings we have a need to touch and be touched. It's vital to successful relationships, including our relationship with God who touches us through the sacraments and through the loving touch of another person.

The Gospel makes clear that the resurrected Jesus was truly human. The reality of Christ's love is tangible, "Tangible" means being understood by the sense of touch. Something that is tangible is physically real and can be touched. "See by my hands and my feet that it is myself" said Jesus to his confused and frightened friends. "Touch me and see for yourselves..." Touch me and see. Touch me and understand. Be informed of - and in touch with - the reality of my existence and my love for you. You are safe. All will be well.

Anybody who is familiar with asthma, either personally or through a family member, knows the limitations on activities – including allergenic foods – and freedoms which

everybody else enjoys.

As we remember St Bernadette, perhaps it is also an opportunity to remember and pray for all those who suffer from asthma.

The power of touch

The power of human touch can never be underestimated. Think about the intimate caress between two lovers silently conveying their affection for one another; the gentle handhold of a nurse caring for a dying patient communicating the ebbing physical connection of this world; the firm hand on the shoulder of the defeated sports player telling them that they will rise and compete again.

As a parent of small children, I think of the kiss that must be administered to the scuffed knee making everything better. "Touch me and see for yourselves" Jesus says. His resurrection is bodily and real, not some lofty idea or ghostly apparition.

His resurrection is rooted in our physical world, our world of touch and intimacy and pain. Our bodies will be part of the new heaven and new earth. Our touch matters. How do we extend that touch here and now so that it lasts in all eternity?

The Gospel for Sunday 14th April 2024 FISH FOR SUPPER

The disciples told their story of what had happened on the road and how they had recognised Jesus at the breaking of bread when Jesus himself stood among them and said to them, "Peace be with you!" In a state of alarm and fright, they thought they were seeing a ghost. But he said, "Why are you so agitated, and why are these doubts rising in your hearts? Look at my hands and feet; yes, it is I indeed. Touch me and see for yourselves; a ghost has no flesh and bones as you can see I have." And as he said this he showed them his hands and feet. Their joy was so great that they could not believe it, and they stood dumbfounded; so he said to them, "Have you anything here to eat?" And they offered him a piece of grilled fish, which he took and ate before their eyes. Then he told them, "This is what I meant when I said. while I was still with you, that everything written about me in the Law of Moses, in the Prophets and in the Psalms, has to be fulfilled." He then opened their minds to understand the scriptures, and he said to them, "So you see how it is written that the Christ would suffer and on the third day rise from the dead, and that, in his name, repentance for the forgiveness of sins would be preached to all the nations, beginning from Jerusalem. You are witnesses to this."

Reflect

After reading the Gospel, did any words stand out? If they did, ponder or discuss them before proceeding with the reflection.

The two disciples had met Jesus on their way to Emmaus. There Jesus had used the Eucharistic meal to reveal himself to them, for the Eucharist is always an occasion for us to get to know the Risen Christ better. Now he meets the whole group of disciples in their refuge, the Upper Room. It is perhaps an account of the same incident that we heard last Sunday, but with different emphasis. Now the stress is on the meeting with a real person, and not with a ghost. That is why Jesus eats a piece of fish. The important lesson of this is that, in our resurrection to true life, it is the whole person that is raised, not just the soul. Christian teaching is that a person is an animated body. We work out our salvation with fingers and toes and other bodily members, and all will be raised to life. It is not just a matter of thoughts and intentions! The whole body is baptised into Christ and is the instrument of our salvation. The body will be changed, and St Paul reminds us that we should not get bogged down with worrying about what sort of body we will have at the resurrection, but rejoice that each of us will be raised as a whole person. What do you imagine the risen life to be like? Is love, friendship and companionship part of this?

Fr Henry's reflections on the first and second readings of Sunday 14th April 2024





1st Reading: Acts 3:13-15. 17-19

Peter's Speech to the People of Jerusalem

Peter said to the people, "You are Israelites, and it is the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, the God of our ancestors, who has glorified his servant Jesus, the same Jesus you handed over and then disowned in the presence of Pilate, after Pilate had decided to release him. It was you who accused the Holy One, the Just One, you who demanded the reprieve of a murderer while you killed the prince of life. God, however, raised him from the dead, and to that fact we are the witnesses. Now I know, brothers, that neither you nor your leaders had any idea what you were really doing; this was the way God carried out what he had foretold, when he said through all his prophets that his Christ would suffer. Now you must repent and turn to God, so that your sins may be wiped out."

This reading is the final section of Peter's speech to the people of Jerusalem after Pentecost, when he is explaining to the crowds the significance of the first miracle worked by the apostles in the power of the Spirit. Like all the speeches in Acts, it is not a word-for-word, tape-recorded report, but is a sample of Peter's preaching to the people. He lays the blame for Jesus' rejection squarely on them, but shows that it was just as scripture had foretold. All of the speeches end with an invitation to repent. This does not mean simply to get all weepy about past sins, thinking 'how dreadful and wicked I have been'. It means that the listeners (and this includes us) must change our ways and adopt God's system of values (as fully revealed by the Risen Christ). To convert means that, whereas before I was going in one direction, now I turn round and go in another. Then the way I look at the world becomes different: I see things from a different angle - from God's, from Christ's angle. This sort of conversion does not so much look at the past with regret as look at the future with confidence. It is the new determination that allows God to wipe out our sins.

What does repentance mean to you? What are God's values, those values revealed in Christ?



2nd Reading: 1 John 2:1-5

Our Advocate with the Father

I am writing this, my children, to stop you sinning; but if anyone should sin, we have our advocate with the Father Jesus Christ, who is just; he is the sacrifice that takes our sins away, and not only ours, but the whole world's. We can be sure that we know God only by keeping his commandments. Anyone who says, 'I know him', and does not keep his commandments, is a liar, refusing to admit the truth. But when anyone does obey what he has said, God's love comes to perfection in him.

This second reading advances a step further beyond the first. The first is about conversion, the second about blotting out former failures. Jesus Christ is our Advocate with the Father, 'standing at the right hand of the Father', because he takes our sins away. How does he do this? By his act of obedience on the Cross, Jesus wipes out the disobedience of Adam, that is, of all humanity. Adam (which is the Hebrew word meaning 'man') is the figure of all humanity, and Adam's sin is the symbol of all human sin, a sort of 'prequel' of all sin, an act of turning away from God, of independence and disobedience. On the Cross, Jesus was perfectly united to the Father, in an act of utter obedience in love, to which the Father in love responds, with a renewal of love for all humanity. For us, too, it is true that if we know God, if we have any appreciation of God and any personal bond to God, we cannot but obey him. God's commands are not arbitrary, but are the way of keeping close to him. By the command of love God reveals himself and invites us to be like him.

Obedience is often understood as doing as we are told, as limiting our freedom. What is Christian obedience about and how would you explain this to somebody else?

 'A. Classroom religious education is outstanding

 • The school has adapted and developed the themes of the Religious Education Curriculum Directory in an excellent manner to meet the learning needs of the pupils of St Mary's.

 • The religious education programme in use fully delivers this content and the use of De Bono system in religious education pushes pupils to develop their understanding further.

 • After carefully analysing the needs of their pupils, the school has developed a curriculum and teaching programme that has reached outstanding achievement by the pupils in religious education.

 • Teachers have high expectations and plan lessons that deepen pupils' religious literacy, since the last inspection, staff confidence in recording and assessment has been demonstrably achieved with the evidence of the clarity and confidence an the part of the staff in planning imaginative lessons based on the religious education programme followed in the school.

 • The headreacher is also the religious education curriculum coordinator and she takes the closest interest in developing the excellent teaching and learning of religious education in the school.
