Catholic Social Teaching (CST) is embedded and referred to within our whole school curriculum. In lessons, our children are able to draw links between the themes that they are studying and how they link to CST themes and 'faith in action'.



	<p>We live in community with others, growing together. We are called to be active participants in all that we do. RE	<p>This programme of study emphasises that humans are social beings, calling us to act for the common good and engage in society. Throughout the 6 different branches the pupils have the opportunity to focus on the community of creation, our role as stewards and the communal nature of the Covenant. The children will explore prophets who call the community back to justice and care for the vulnerable, highlighting the duty to participate in social change. They will examine Jesus' ministry, his community, and his teachings on inclusion (e.g. Zacchaeus) and the parables, directly modelling active participation. They consider Lent, reconciliation and the community of the Church in times of profound struggle and they explore early Christian community, the Pentecost, and the church as a global, participating community. Finally, in the unit Dialogue and Encounter the children are encouraged to explore participation within wider society, building bridges with others to foster the common good.</p>
ENGLISH	<p>By weaving together elements of reading, writing, and communication, the literacy curriculum invites learners to investigate their roles within their communities.
