Catholic Social Teaching (CST) is embedded and referred to within our whole school curriculum. In lessons, our children are able to draw links between the themes that they are studying and how they link to CST themes and 'faith in action'.

RE	Children learn about Catholic faith through topics including Creation and Covenant, Prophecy and Promise, Galilee to Jerusalem, Desert to Garden, To the Ends of the Earth and Dialogue and Encounter. This strand emphasises the inherent worth of every individual, recognising that each person is created in the image of God. The RE curriculum fosters this understanding by encouraging students to explore their own identities and the identities of others, promoting self-awareness and respect for diversity. Through activities that engage students in discussions about personal experiences, values, and beliefs, the curriculum cultivates an environment where the dignity of each person is acknowledged and celebrated. Furthermore, it encourages critical reflection on social justice issues, enabling students to understand their role in advocating for the dignity of others.
ENGLISH	The Catholic social teaching principle of 'Dignity of the Human Person' is effectively integrated into our primary literacy curriculum by fostering an environment that values each child's unique identity and potential.
